Cultivate an Opportunity Mindset

- View obstacles as openings for innovation
- Ask questions like “What could be done better?”
- Recognize that most successful businesses are born from unmet needs

Stay Curious in a Crowded World

- Regularly ask what frustrates you or your customers
- Question the norm rather than accepting it
- Stay alert even when business is going well

Listen Intentionally

- Customers, employees, and markets give clues—pay attention
- Treat complaints and frustrations as insight
- Listen to understand, not to respond

Be Open to Change

- Comfort with the current process can become a barrier
- Revisit assumptions and stay receptive to feedback
- Openness invites improvement and long-term relevance

Embrace Small Innovations

- Big change is rare—most innovation is small and consistent
- Improve speed, service, or user experience
- Simple adjustments can set a business apart

Surround Yourself with Diverse Thinkers

- Expand your network across industries and backgrounds
- Encourage dialogue with customers, peers, and mentors
- Exposure to different viewpoints leads to sharper ideas

Prepare for Opportunities

- Stay lean, ready, and adaptable
- Test before perfection
- Create a culture where experimentation is safe

Take the Shot

- Not every idea will succeed, but each teaches something
- Movement beats inaction
- Progress creates momentum

Keep Evolving

- Businesses must adapt to survive
- Innovation is ongoing, not a one-time effort
- Stay relevant by continuing to improve and grow
